


Fellowship Crossword Puzzle - On the Frontlines of Faith

- The rights of citizens to political and social freedom and equality
- 3 The capital of Alabama that was at the center of much civil rights activities in the early 1960s
- 8 A tactic of withholding commercial or social relationships used by civil rights leaders to protest racial discrimination
- 11 The figurative description of where the Jewish community stood with African Americans in the fight for equality and justice
- 12 The amendment to the U.S. Constitution which abolished slavery in 1865
- 13 Site of the 1963 civil rights rally that attracted more than 300,000 where Dr. King gave his famous "I Have a Dream" speech
- 16 Civil rights activists in the early 1960s who rode buses throughout the South to protest segregation
- 19 Influential rabbi who was an early supporter of the civil rights movement and who joined with Dr. King and others on many of the marches and protests
- 20 African American woman who refused to give up her seat on a bus to a white patron, spurring the Montgomery Bus Boycott

- 2 The systematic separation of people based on race as a form of discrimination
- 4 A key principle of the early civil rights movement to implement change without destructive behavior
- 5 The combination of educational and other public facilities, previously segregated by race, into unified systems shared by all races
- 6 The Christian minister and activist who became the most visible spokesperson and leader in the civil rights movement
- 7 Rabbi and President of the American Jewish Congress who spoke at the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom
- 9 The unjust treatment of different categories of people, especially on the grounds of race, age, and sex
- 10 Activist in India whose nonviolent resistance to British rule inspired Dr. King and the civil rights movement in the U.S.
- 14 Prolonged cruel or unjust treatment of one group of people over another
- 15 One of the founding members of the NAACP (National Association for the Advancement of Colored People) in 1909
- 17 The condition in which one human being is owned by another, with few, if any, personal rights; an experience shared by both the Jewish and African American communities
- **18** Where the 1965 March of civil rights leaders to the Alabama state capital began



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
